There are currently about 1.3 million registered Afghan refugees resident in Pakistan, according to the United Nations High Commission for Refugees (UNHCR). There are also about a million unregistered Afghan refugees present in the country.

A recent crackdown by Pakistani authorities, citing security concerns, has seen a sharp rise in both deportations and voluntary repatriations of Afghan nationals from the country.

Last year, more than 600,000 Afghan refugees left Pakistan to return to their home countries, data from the UNHCR and the International Organization for Migration (IOM) shows. (Pajhwok)

"We have our eyes on Kabul today, following the tragic suicide bombing that killed at least 19 Afghan civilians," White House Press Secretary Sean Spicer told reporters at his daily news conference.

This morning, he said, General (R) Michael Flynn spoke with the Afghan national security adviser to reaffirm America's continued support for Afghanistan and for their strategic partnership.

"We condemn this cowardly attack in the strongest possible terms, and we commend the Afghan security forces for their rapid response," he remarked.

"We also reaffirmed our support for the Afghan government as they work to defend their people and against enemies of peace," Spicer said.

In a statement, the Security Council also condemned the "heinous and cowardly terrorist attack" in Kabul. UNSC members expressed concern over the threat posed by Taliban, Al Qaeda and ISIS.

"The 15-member body reiterates its serious concern at the threats posed by the Taliban, Al-Qaida, ISIL/Daesh and illegal and armed groups to the local population, security forces and the international presence in Afghanistan."

Underlining the need to bring perpetrators, organisers, financiers and sponsors of the reprehensible acts of terrorism to justice, the Security Council urged all states to cooperate actively with the Afghan authorities.

It urged all countries to combat by all means, in accordance with the UN Charter and other obligations under international law, in particular international human rights and refugee laws, threats to peace and security.

"The members of the Security Council reiterate that no violent or terrorist acts can reverse the Afghan-led process along the path towards peace, democracy and stability," the statement said.

Pakistan also strongly condemned the suicide attack outside Supreme Court of Afghanistan on 7 February 2017 that has led to loss of twenty precious human lives and left more than 40 injured, a statement from the foreign office said on Wednesday.

The people and the Government of Pakistan extend their heartfelt sympathies and deepest condolences to the Government and people of Afghanistan and to the bereaved families, the statement said.

"We pray for early recovery of injured. We firmly stand with our Afghan brothers in this hour of grief and anguish."

The European Union (EU) condemned yesterday's attack on Afghanistan's SC staff

Employees of the Afghan Supreme Court have again been a target of a despicable attack, which has claimed the lives of at least 20 innocent people and many others injured. Our thoughts are with the families of those who have been killed, and we wish those who have been injured a speedy recovery, the EU statement said.

A functioning justice system will guarantee the respect of the Afghan

constitution and is of utmost importance for a democratic and peaceful Afghanistan. The EU stood by the Afghan authorities and calls on all Afghans to stay united in support of our combined efforts to fight the global threat of terrorism.

The UN Assistance Mission in Afghanistan (UNAMA) condemned Tuesday's suicide attack in Kabul which killed at least 20 civilians and injured more than 40 others. Many of those killed and wounded were women, most of them female Supreme Court employees, according to a statement from the UN mission.

"This attack appears to have deliberately targeted civilian judicial staff as they were leaving the office for the day," said Tadamichi Yamamoto, the Secretary-General's Special Representative for Afghanistan and head of UNAMA. "This attack is nothing short of an atrocity. Those responsible for planning and carrying out this horrendous act must be brought to justice."

UNAMA noted with concern a pattern of attacks against judicial authorities in recent years. Since the beginning of 2015 alone, UNAMA has documented 74 attacks targeting judges, prosecutors and judicial staff, which have resulted in 89 dead and 214 injured. It reminded all parties that judges and staff of civilian courts - including the Supreme Court - are civilians. Attacks intentionally targeting civilians are tantamount to war crimes.

UNAMA expressed deep condolences to the families of those killed and wishes a swift recovery to the injured. (Pajhwok)

Critics have blasted government for having taken a year to make the decision, that should have been made by the Ministry of Education.

According to critics, tension between NUG leaders is quite high and they want to portray their small issues as big gains to the public.

"They want to mislead public opinion from their internal disputes, therefore they reflect their minor gains as major attainments," said journalist Faridoun Azhand.

Government leaders want to redirect the public's attention away from their internal disputes and differences, therefore they portray petty things as major achievements, said critics.

Following months of discussions, NUG leaders finally agreed to change the school uniforms from black to blue and brown.

"Changing the color of the uniform of school girls was proposed by the ministry of education which was sent to the council of ministers. On the basis of the proposal, uniforms of primary schools will be blue and secondary schools brown," said the CEO's deputy spokesman Jawed Faisal.

One university lecturer, Tahir Hashimi said: "They agree on smaller issues because they don't have any gains, they want to portray it as a gain because of their compulsions."

"They have not done anything positive for the people, I don't think that they can overcome their disputes during their term of government," a Kabul shopkeeper, Mohammad Sadiq, said.

"None of these leaders delivered on their promises, they pledged to create jobs, but nothing has happened," said a resident of Kabul Ghulam Jailani.

Experts say that the ongoing rift between NUG leaders could have serious repercussions for the country in future. (Tolonews)

Turkistani, the chief of the provincial police, confirmed the attack, saying it took place 35 kilometers (22 miles) west of the provincial capital, Shibirghan.

No one immediately claimed the attack, but Turkistani said militants loyal to the Islamic State group have a presence in the area. The Taliban denied involvement.

Elsewhere in Afghanistan, a suicide bomber detonated his payload after being stopped outside a district headquarters in the eastern Paktia province, killing two civilians and wounding a policeman, said Abdullah Asrat, the spokesman for the provincial governor.

No one claimed responsibility, but the Taliban frequently attack government targets.

On Tuesday, a suicide bomber struck at the entrance to the Afghan Supreme Court in the capital, Kabul, killing at least 20 people and wounding more than 40. (AP)

After HIA leader Gulbuddin Hekmatyar's removal from the UN sanctions list, another condition the party has set for the government is the release of its inmates.

HIA spokesman Dr. Hamid Azizi, when approached for comments on the PIJC list, refused to say anything. All HIA inmates were political prisoners some of whom might have been awarded severe punishments, he said.

The party has shared a list of 700 prisoners with the government, seeking their release. "We have sent lists of HIA prisoners to the government in three phases," the spokesman said.

"In the first, we share with authorities a list of 270 individuals, in the second 208 and in the third - an addendum to the first - 179. The cases of nearly 150 prisoners have been finalised and they will be freed in the next few days."

However, he complained some institutions, financed by foreigners and Afghanistan's enemies, were trying to impede the peace process - a proof of continued international meddling in the country's internal affairs.

The landmark peace agreement between the government and HIA was inked on September 29, 2016 by President Ashraf Ghani and Gulbuddin Hekmatyar.

Eng. Mohammad Amin Karim, the HIA delegation head, told a news conference on Tuesday his party and the government were seriously preparing for the arrival of Hekmatyar in Kabul.

To a question posed regarding an HIA apology for its past activities, he said nowhere in the world an accused had sought pardon before being found guilty.

A bout the HIA activities, he said: "We are fighting for freedom for more than 48 years; we have sacrificed the most and are proud of our nation. We consider ourselves as fallible, we don't claim to be angels." (Pajhwok)

"Our assessment from the GDP shows that every eighteen to twenty billion Afs investment contributes one percent increase to the economic growth," said Suhrah Bahman, spokesman for the ministry of economy.

Economic commentators have raised concerns over the issues facing national budget spend every year, suggesting President Ashraf Ghani should implement reward and punishment programs in order to achieve better outcomes.

According to the ministry, it is better for government to spend the national budget through government's financial units as this would help boost economic progress in the country.

But economists say that their evaluations indicate that the implementation of transitional projects and allocation of new funds within the national budget system have contributed nothing significant to the national economic growth. (Tolonews)

Information Law a big hurdle to investigative journalism.

But government officials, however, said they were ready to help journalists if they faced with any problem in discharging their duty.

Jawad Nabizada, a journalist in Mazar-i-Shaif, the provincial capital, identified two major reasons - insecurity and lack of financial resources - discouraging investigative journalism.

Nabizada said he would not work on a story after which he or his family could be threatened or their lives put in danger. He accused government institutions of not sharing information with journalists in time.

Qayyum Babak, known as investigative journalist in the northern zone, said journalists produced fewer investigative reports in the north and especially in Balkh because of increased threats.

"I am one of the journalists who are threatened for writing investigative reports, and there has been a conspiracy ongoing against us," said Babak, admitting it was fear for life that dis-

heartened journalists to work on investigative reports.

A reporter in Kunduz province, Gul Rahim Niaz, also called as problematic working on investigative reports.

He said there were several reasons journalists should fear about their safety while writing investigative reports. He saw fear behind self-censorship.

Giving an example, Niaz said: "A few years ago, I made an investigative report on usurpation of commercial lands. A powerful man entered a dispute with me over the report. He was supported by the governor of a northern province."

"We cannot dare write a piece on drug smuggling between Tajikistan and Afghanistan and on administrative corruption in which strongmen and government officials are involved," he sighed.

Investigative journalist in Mazar-i-Sharif, Nasim Ronaq, said whenever she had attempted writing an investigative report she had either been put in trouble by a powerful man or a government official.

She told Pajhwok she had stopped working on investigative reports because she feared for her own and her family's safety.

She said she was working for improvement in the society and if her reports put her life in danger, she would not do that.

A journalist from Baghlan province, Samiullah, said government officials and Taliban militants both created hurdles to journalists in working on investigative reports.

He said there were many subjects in Baghlan that needed investigation, but he could not research on them due to threats.

He said people's had doubts about insecurity on the Baghlan-Kunduz and Baghlan-Mazar-i-Shari highways and the issue needed to be investigated and the reasons revealed.

Samiullah said he would be threatened with elimination if he started investigating such issues.

However, Journalist Association representatives said the absence of law enforcement was the mother of all problems. (Pajhwok)
