Just hours before the introduction of the cabinet, nominee for the Ministry of Water and Energy Mahmoud Saikal withdrew his nomination after expressing his conclusion with Chief Executive Abdullah Abdullah. Saikal has been replaced by Abdul Rahman Salahi, an ally of former Minister of Water and Energy and former Jihadist leader Ismail Khan.

On Monday former Gen. Director of the Independent Directorate for Local Governance (IDLG) Jilani Popal, withdrew his nomination as Minister of Finance to keep his dual citizenship, according to officials. Another cabinet nominee Mohammad Yaqoob Haidari, who was nominated for the Ministry of Agriculture, has been on Interpol's most wanted since 2003 and asks the government for the suspension of his nomination until the allegations have cleared.

The nominees will present their platforms to the Wolesi Jirga starting Wednesday and the next two days. The MPs will make their final decision sometime next week on the cabinet. (Tolonews)

Masoom Stanikzai and Gulab Mangal are respectively in the run for governors of Farah, Helmand, Ghazni, Kandahar and Nangarhar provinces.

Former president Hamid Karzai had recommended Mangal as Kandahar governor, but later Masoom Stanikzai also jumped into the race, the source said. Halim Fidaee was initially con-

sidered as Helmand governor, but later his appointment to Ghazni came under discussion. "Now he is being tipped as Paktia governor."

Farah, Helmand and Ghazni, provinces that are currently grappling with a variety of problems, including insecurity, will get new governors on a priority basis.

But Fidaee, a former Maidan Wardak governor and member of the Change and Continuity team, said new provincial chief executives would not be named before a cabinet was sworn in. Farah, where several senior officials including the governor were sacked a day earlier, would get priority, Fidaee believed, denying he had been offered any slot.

President Ashraf Ghani's administration, promising substantive institutional reforms, has already replaced Kunduz and Paktika chief executives. (Pajhwok)

"I sold everything including my mother's jewellery. I lied about everything to everybody and when my mother came to know about it, she fell sick for a long time," he added.

It is the fifth time he has been admitted to hospital, but rehabilitation efforts have had no impact on him because once out, he would easily find drugs again. "Just with one call, they will bring you anything on a motorbike."

Eid Mohammad, 28, slipped into addiction in Iran. Back home in Bagram district, drugs are easily available to him. "Maybe anything you do in this world is good, except using drugs. It ruins your life."

Shakir, a Charikar resident, claimed drugs were sold openly in places like the old city, Nawda, Tutumdara and Tajikan. He lambasted the government for not paying adequate attention to the issue.

"If the government were doing its job properly, we wouldn't have had so many addicts in our province," Shakir argued. Niamatullah Rashid, head of the hospital, said 430 addicts had been rehabilitated in Parwan over the last three years, but 300 of them returned to drug abuse.

Out of 10,000 addicts in the province 300 are women and 500 children. The figures saw a dramatic rise in the last three years, he said. (Pajhwok)

The allegation comes after the Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC) recently built houses for residents who had lost their homes to the natural disaster. At least 72 people, including

15 women and 36 children, were killed and dozens others wounded in the devastating flash floods that washed away 1,200 houses in the district in June 2014.

The NRC has built homes for 650 families and provided each of them with a coverlet, coal and a heater.

NRC head in the north, Habibullah Mujadidi, said the new homes were allotted to the most deserving people.

He said the NRC spent more than \$600,000 to construct the houses and providing other assistance to the families.

Rahim Dad, a resident, said: "I lost all my family members to the floods and I currently live alone in a house built by the

Arbab Sirajuddin, a tribal elder, said the flood-affected people had long been facing numerous problems such as shortages of food, firewood, appliances and others.

He alleged local officials had misused and pocketed much of the aid that was supposed to be given to the affected families. He urged the international community to fulfill its promises of aid to the flood victims. (Pajhwok)

She slammed the United Nations for not giving Bacha Khan a peace prize the way the word's body conferred it on Nelson Mandela, a South African anti-apartheid revolutionary.

ANP central committee member from Balochistan Aurangzeb Kasi said observing the death anniversary of Bacha Khan in Nangarhar was aimed to reassure all Afghans that they would continue his mission.

Born in 1980, Bacha Khan was a Pashtun independence activist and a lifelong spiritual leader known for his nonviolent freedom struggle.

He strongly opposed the partition of the subcontinent when the Indian National Congress accepted the plan. "You have thrown us to the wolves," a perturbed Khan told the Congress.

However, Bacha Khan pledged allegiance to Pakistan after its creation in 1947 and demanded an autonomous Pashtunistan, but he was frequently arrested by the Pakistani government between 1948 and 1954.

Bacha Khan also spent much of the 1960s and 1970s either in jail or in exile. Upon his death in 1988 in Peshawar under house arrest, he was buried at his house in Jalalabad following his will.

Tens of thousands of mourners attended his funeral coming from Peshawar to Jalalabad. Despite the heavy fighting at the time, both sides of the Soviet and Afghan armies and the mujahideen declared a ceasefire to allow his burial. (Pajhwok)

Russia Must Strengthen Army to Defend Itself: Putin

MOSCOW - President Vladimir Putin said on Tuesday Russia must strengthen its armed forces to protect its sovereignty against the "challenge" posed by other countries that might threaten

Moscow. Putin's comments reinforced his commitment to an expensive program to modernize the armed forces, which the Finance Ministry has signaled will be excluded from any budget cuts forced on the government by a growing economic crisis.

"We will continue to strengthen our armed forces and military organizations as a whole by making them modern, mobile, well-equipped and capable of performing their main task - to neutralize risks and political, potential threats to the security of our country," Putin told a meeting of Russia's industry commission. Putin has also accused the United States of trying to subjugate Russia, has blamed the West for the overthrow of a Moscowbacked president in Ukraine last year and has said Washington stoked protests against him three years ago.
