President Ashraf Ghani and other government officials were also present on the occasion.

Water and Energy Minister Ali Ahmad Osmani said the project would be launched in July of current year and would be completed in December, 2019.

He said the government had designed double circuit for the 220kw transmission line from Doshi to Bamyan, which could transmit 300 megawatts of electricity to the central province.

He said for electricity distribution, one substation with the capacity of 32 megawatt and one transformer with capacity of 20kw would be installed in Bamyan City.

He said all central provinces would benefit from the 300 megawatt power line and it would provide adequate power to small and medium industries.

ADB country director Thomas Panella said building the infrastructure would benefit areas which were deprived of electricity.

He said the project implementation would boost economic and commercial activities and it would bless Bamyan residents with a good life.

The project would be implemented with financial support from ADB, Dilawari said, without providing the total cost.

He said the designed line and substation's capacity was determined at 300 megawatt and had the same power capacity as the Salang Pass power line. Urban Development Minister Syed Sadat Mansur Nadiri said the project would take at least three years as practical work on the project would start in August and would take around three years and 20,000 families would benefit from electricity in the first stage.

According to the presidential decree, he said, relevant departments were obligated to provide electricity transmission plan for other central provinces within the next six months. (Pajhwok)

by an acting minister for the past two and a half years. The NDS has also been spearheaded by an acting head after Rahmatullah Nabil resigned as spymaster in December, 2015.

A number of lawmakers have previously complained that one major cause of insecurity in the country was acting leadership of security organs.

At Sunday's session, lawmakers also debated the presidential legislative decree on electoral reform rejected a couple of days back.

both capabilities in service here." The new helicopters increase the AAF inventory from 13 to 18. "Some Afghans were skeptical of the MD-530 when it first started operating, however, it has proven itself in combat," said Ashford. "Now everyone wants MD-530 support. The pilots are doing great work flying daily combat missions supporting (ANA) troops on the ground and escorting AAF Mi-17s in the air." Ashford said all of the helicopters were shipped from MD Helicopters Inc., in Mesa, Ariz., and all 18 are armed with two .50-caliber machine gun pods. The first six were delivered in March 2015 to help fulfill aerial fires gap for the 2015 Fighting Season.

At a price of about \$5 million each, the MD-530 provides both an economical and critical air-to-ground capability, enabling pilots to engage the enemy. As with all major systems procured for the AAF, the MD-530s were purchased using the Afghan Security Forces Fund. By the end of August 2016, the AAF is scheduled to receive nine more MD-530s for a total strength of 27. Gen. Dawlat Waziri, spokesman for the Ministry of Defence (MoD) confirmed the US handed over five new MD-530 Cayuse Warrior helicopters to AAF on Saturday. He said the copters would help Afghan ground forces in their anti-rebel of fensive and would provide air support to the troops on the ground. He said the US

earlier also provided similar copters and was expected more copters and aircraft to be inducted in AAF. (Pajhwok)

family violence," Minister of Women Affairs Dilbar Nazari said.
