If the government did not stop meddling, the electoral watchdogs would be bound to expose something in this regard and question the continuation and transparency of the election process, he warned.

The deputy head of IEC has so far said nothing in this regard, but Shah Hussain Murtazavi, deputy spokesman for President Ashraf Ghani, said the Presidential Palace had not asked IEC to send a new list of names.

He said IEC members had failed to agree on the first three candidates; hence the issue of selecting a person from amongst them could not be finalised.

Najibullah Ahmadzai, the IEC head, on Sunday warned against interference from the government and politicians. He said such meddling harmed the independence of the commission. (Pajhwok)

Deputy Wolesi Jirga speaker, Erfanullah Erfan, did not say anything when asked why female lawmakers were absent from the meeting.

He said the religion of Islam gave rights to women in a just manner. Some women's right organizations worked only to earn money rather than protecting their rights, he believed.

forward toward holding transparent elections in Afghanistan in the future. However there are some concerns that all Afghan citizens may not be able to get their cards by the time of the elections.

There is speculation that fundamental reforms have not been put in place in Afghanistan's election system in the view of current challenges facing Afghanistan's election management bodies - the Independent Election Commission (IEC) and the Electoral Complaints Commission (ECC).

"After the ratification of the census law and after the issuing of the legislative order by the president, practical steps for the roll-out process of electronic ID cards will be started," said Mohammad Hedayat, media advisor to Danish.

Three years have passed since politicians started grappling with the issues over the e-NIC roll-out. Constant delays have also followed because of major distrust between donors. (Tolonews)

decision on whether or not to reopen the border is yet to be taken," the source said, indicating certain individuals like patients having appointments with doctors in Pakistan could be allowed entry.

In order to block unlawful entries, the official suggested border controls could be further toughened. Fencing was one option and work on the project might be initiated in a month or two, he added.

He said marking the day of soldier would help security forces create a place in people's hearts and gain people's cooperation in maintaining security. It would also encourage the youth to join security forces, he said. Paktika

Abdul Raziq, a member of the Afghan Special Security Forces, in southeastern Paktika province, said he was ready to protect the nation at the cost of his life. He said he would not allow anyone to create insecurity. The soldier said they had currently no problem to face and urged the masses to cooperate with security forces.

Takhar Policeman Akhtar Mohammad in Chal district of northern Takhar province, complained about the shortage of logistics and other equipment.

The 40-year-old said he joined the force a year back and had not yet gone home on leave. "We are not given equipment we need. I have purchased the boots myself."

"We are given one Kalashnikov each with two magazines and are asked to go to the battlefield. Can the war be fought this way? We are not given uniform and boots."

He said those having connection with higher ups enjoyed many facilities and they spent at least 10 days each month at home.

Herat Abdul Saboor, a border police officer in western Herat province, said: "Police are servants of the people. We urge the government and the people to support police and give them respect." His demand was an increase in their salaries.

Helmand In southern Helmand province, 215 Maiwand Military Corps service member Syed Ahmad said they received salaries in-time. He called on the government to increase its efforts at ending the conflict in order people could get a sigh of relief.

He said the Afghan security forces were fighting for the defense of their country, honour and frontiers at the cost of their lives.

Syed Ahmad was talking to Pajhwok Afghan News after attending a gathering that paid tribute to security forces in the capital of Helmand, Lashkargah. Deputy interior minister for administration Ikramuddin Yawar also attended the gathering.

Yawar promised on the occasion that the government would resolve problems being faced by the families of martyred security personnel and people with disabilities. (Pajhwok)

disagreement of the IEC chief. An IEC official, who wished to go unnamed, told Pajhwok Afghan News the poll panel head, Najibullah Ahmadzai, was asked to introduce another six candidates for the slot.

But Amadzai asked government had to choose one of the three candidates in line with the election law, the source said, adding the IEC chief was not ready to introduce more candidates in violation of Article 22 of the law.

The Presidential Palace later asked the deputy chief of the commission, Waseema Badghisi to introduce another six candidates for the position, a request that was accepted by Badghisi.

The new candidates for the post are Abdur Rahim Daud Rahimi, Mohammad Reza Katib, Syed Jamaluddin Sahibzada, Khwaja Mohammad Asami, Abdul Aziz Samim and Ahmad Shah Zamanzai. (Pajhwok)

She cited ubiquitous insecurity, low salaries and female prosecutors' positions held by men as main reasons behind women's unwillingness to work at the attorney's office.

According to her, a man is currently serving as head of the section for preventing violence against women. "I want women to serve in jobs reserved for them," the official added. Shakiba initially worked as a volunteer, but the attorney general's office

later appointed her to the position. Now she is the only woman judicial official across the eastern zone.

Shakiba said she had no problem with the work environment or male associates, but she would serve more freely and confidently in the company of female colleagues.

She asked the AGO and international legal aid organisations to pay greater heed to appointing female judges and prosecutors to see to it that women's issues were resolved by women.

Prevention of violence against women section chief Abdul Waheed Hakimi told Pajhwok Afghan News Shakiba could be assigned to probe women-related cases. But there is still need for more female prosecutors.

"Earlier, we used to investigate women's cases through female defense lawyers. After Shakiba's appointment, however, the issue has been resolved," he observed.

Provincial attorney Khalid Orya acknowledged female prosecutors faced a lot of problems in the past, but efforts were being made to encourage more women to serve as prosecutors.

Based on recommendations from AGO, he said, programmes were being carried out for professionally training women prosecutors. Around 40 law faculty female graduates will be trained for six months.

"Also, they would be also paid stipends during this period of six months and efforts will be made to create job opportunities for them by the end of the training programme," he promised.

Nangarhar attorney's office is not the only organisation that has only one female worker; the court of appeals and other judicial institutions neither have female judges nor women employees.

Nangarhar Appellate Court Judge Abdul Wali Qazizada told Pajhwok there was not a single female judge in the province, though some women defence lawyers were there.

Efforts are being made to hire female personnel to ensure gender equality, but no one has evinced any interest in such jobs, according to the judge.

"Security may have an impact, but the main problem is the salary and internship. Salaries are dismally low and women are not interested in working as they have to go through two years of judicial internship in Kabul," Qazizada argued.

Despite millions of dollars that have been spent on promoting women's rights in the country over the past 15 years, particularly in Nangarhar, no female judge/prosecutor has been appointed. (Pajhwok)

were not given religious books for study and accused the jail authorities of foot-dragging in establishing a seminary.

He also claimed the jail officials were not giving the government food to inmates free of charge.

Another inmate, Mullah Abdul Manan Akhund, confirmed the claims and said ailing inmates were not taken to hospital for treatment in-time and many prisoners had lost their lives due to the lack of medicines.

"When an ailing inmates cries for help, the jail guards don't come to him and if they take him to hospital, the inmate is charged 500 afghanis for a packet of tablets and 1500 afghanis for an injection," he claimed. Mullah Akhund said most of the prisoners lacked access to clean drinking water and electricity, confirming about 700 inmates had gone on hunger strike.

Akhund, a political prisoner, was arrested by security forces in southern Helmand province three years ago. He and several others inmates said if their problems were not resolved, they would continue denying food. But the jail's commander, Brig. Gen. Mohammad Tawab Ahmadzai, told Pajhwok Afghan News that no one

in the jail had gone on hunger strike. About the demands of the prisoners, he said there were no such problems as mentioned by the inmates.

He said no inmate was treated unfairly and all received their rights on time. "I am right now at the jail, no one has staged a hunger strike."

Afghanistan prisoners director Abdul Halim Kohistani said they had not received any report about hunger strike by the Pul-i-Charkhi inmates. (Pajhwok)

According to the documents, the fall of the check-posts to a Taliban's shadow governor named Khyber, a relative of Haqyar, was fixed in advance.

"If he has committed any of the actions he has been accused of, he will be taken to judicial centers," Paktia governor, Zalmai Wesa said.

The matter was brought to the attention of Parliament's Internal Security Commission and their findings show that the falling of the check-posts were fixed in exchange of money.

The documents say that the forces under command of Haqyar are unhappy with his activities and that his appointment as security head for Paktia province should be prohibited.

"Intelligence and security departments shared the information with the commission and then we shared the information with the ministry of interior and judicial centers," said Mirdad Nejrab, head of the parliament internal security commission.

Haqyar has been appointed in this position twice. The Commander of the second brigade of border police also has said Haqyar lacks leadership capabilities, is a corrupt and has ties with armed anti-government groups.

The documents indicate that Haqyar is Khyber Mangal's uncle son, a key Haqqani Network commander and that they studied together in Pakistan.

"The accusations are being investigated by us and intelligence departments. If the accusations are proved to be true, he will be punished," said Najib Danish, deputy spokesman of interior ministry.

According to the documents, when Haqqani Network militants attacked on police check-posts in Dand-e-Patan district last year, Haqyar did not backup the border forces. (Tolonews)

find a proper solution to the matter." Meanwhile, Mohammad Rafiq Sherzai, Herat regional hospital spokesman, said about 50 people who were gunned down had been registered with the hospital this solar year. He said they had received 300 people with bullet wounds at the hospital during the period.

"Military personnel were among those killed and wounded but most of the victims were civilians."

Abdul Ahad Walizada, police spokesman, said nearly 270 individuals had been arrested in the past one month in connection with terrorist attacks, armed robberies, kidnapping, murder, smuggling and moral corruption. According to him, different kinds of weapons were also seized from the detainees.

He said three alleged assassins were detained by police recently before they could achieve their goal.

However, local residents accused security forces of incompetency, saying they have no programme in hand to ensure security of the provincial capital, Herat City.

Mohammad Qasam Faqiri, Guzra district people's council head, said security situation was deteriorating day by day in the province. "Recently there were murders every day, but still no security measures have been taken."

He while accusing the governor and security forces of incompetency, said: "Our neighbors also don't have good intentions towards our country."

Ismail Rahimi, a resident of Herat city, said: "People are tired of denouncing untoward incidents, now is the time to take a serious action." He asked the government to take prompt action curbing assassination incidents.

Meanwhile, experts and analysts said the increasing murder cases in Herat showed the weakness of secu-

rity forces and judicial organs.

Abdul Qader Kamil, a political analyst in Herat, said: "Security forces' duty is law enforcement, ensuring the law and order and combating terrorism. But when security forces fail to do their duty, assassinations increase."

He said the increasing murders had further eroded people's confidence in security forces. (Pajhwok)
