President Ashraf Ghani approved the amendments in the Census Law on Thursday and paved the way for the new identity cards issuance.

"It has multiple benefits, because one of the serious problems that we are facing is that there is no exact figures and statistics in different fields," Ghani said on Thursday after approving the amendments.

"All people are happy with the amendments and I welcome it. I hope its practical steps move on quickly," the Chief Executive Abdullah Abdullah said.

Meanwhile, the European Union Ambassador to Afghanistan welcomed the move and said the issuance of the electronic identity cards will help maintain security, good governance and will improve services to the people.

More than \$100 million USD has been estimate for the rollout process of the new identity cards which will be funded by the European Union, reports indicate. (Tolonews)

### (8) Ghani Endorses ...

the draft amendments concerning the distribution of computerised ID cards. A legislative decree ratifying the changes was also issued, the 2nd vice-president's office said.

A statement from the VP office said Article 6 of the Population Registration Act was about the registration of an individual's particulars in computerised ID cards. The changes endorsed by the president allow inclusion of the word 'Afghan' and one's ethnicity.

Draft amendments to Article 6 were introduced and approved last year by the Cabinet's Rules Committee, headed by 2nd VP Mohammad Sarwar Danish.

After the president's approval, the draft was referred to the cabinet for final consent. After a year, the draft was referred to the cabinet. Besides its approval by the cabinet, the changes were also upheld by the president through a legislative decree.

The statement added the draft's endorsement into the presidential decree removed obstacles in the way of distributing computerised ID cards. The distribution process will be initiated soon.

Earlier, some circles insisted only the Islamic Republic of Afghanistan should be written in the ID cards and there was no need to mention the words Afghan and tribes.

Many opined that the Islamic Republic of Afghanistan should be written in ID cards because other information about holders was saved in supporting database. (Pajhwok)

disease has permeated the Bed village in the district and so far has killed two children, said Khaliqdad Akbari, head of Ghazni Provincial Council.

He said the disease has so far infected at least 40 children.

The meetings focused on sharing of information and charting a clear agenda for improved coordination between Afghanistan and Pakistan.

Parmiggiani chaired the day's events, assisted by TJOC NATO personnel, and led participants through a series of discussions that gave attendees the opportunity to tackle numerous challenging Af-Pak border subjects.

He clearly explained RS's stance on the current situation along the Durand Line. "We were extremely happy to have facilitated a 're-start' of the counter-IED discussion forum at the tripartite one-star level," Parmiggiani explained.

"This will provide a significant connection between the two Armies for the counter-IED fight."

RS has held Tripartite meetings on a monthly basis since October 2016. However, this was the first Counter-IED Tripartite since May 2015, and represented an opportunity for increased cooperation for both sides.

"RS HQ is encouraged that persistent engagement by Afghans and Pakistani military professionals will complement other discussions taking place between the two countries."

"The threats that exist on both sides of the Durand Line cannot be neutralized without continued interaction at all bilateral levels, but especially within the military" Parmiggiani added. (Pajhwok)

three districts down in southern Nangarhar," said Cleveland.

He said Afghan forces launched a fresh operation in two districts in the province about a month ago with the assistance of U.S. airpower, and the effort is progressing well.

The spokesman reiterated that IS militants are primarily active in Nangarhar and in nearby districts of neighboring Kunar province, but he denied the existence of the terrorist outfit in northern Afghan regions, citing intelligence gathered by the U.S. military.

Cleveland said the U.S. military was able to kill 12 top leaders of IS, including its regional chief, in 2016, degrading the terrorist threat in Afghanistan.

The US military spokesman criticised Russia and Iran for maintaining overt contacts with the Taliban insurgency, saying it undermined the Afghan government's efforts against terrorist forces in the country.

Moscow and Tehran believed the emergence of IS loyalists in Afghanistan poses a threat to their regional interests and territorial boundaries, and justifies their ties with the Taliban, saying the Islamist insurgency is fighting IS to prevent it from expanding its influence in the war-torn country. Shuja Khan, another police officer, said he was wounded critically in the attack.

"Something was thrown inside the room and the room caught fire," he added.

The attack happened when a number of police force members were under training at the military campus.

Parwiz was one of them. "We were sitting behind a container. They [the attackers] threw hand grenades at us," Parwiz said.

A policewoman, who also sustained injuries in the attack, said

she lives in a rented house and is the only bread winner of her seven children and her jobless husband.

"They [the militants] must never think that we are afraid. I would be proud to be killed in a police uniform. I will resume my duty if they call me to come today. I am not afraid of Taliban or Daesh," she stated.

Officials in the Police Hospital said at least 33 wounded, including three women were taken to the hospital following the attack.

They said many of them were sent back home while 10 are still under treatment at the hospital. (Tolonews)

Sifatullah Samangani, the provincial council head, said currently hundreds of residents took their patients to Balkh province or Kabul for treatment. If other businessmen also invested in such projects, health issues would be resolved, the public representative believed.

Dr. Ikramuddin Wakilzada, the provincial hospital head, also hailed the investment in the health sector. He said the population of the province was increasing and so were people's health problems.

He said currently, 34 health centres were functioning in Samangan, including the provincial civil hospital and three others in districts. The remaining 30 health centres could not cope with the number of patients.

He hoped with the completion of the hospital, having standard equipment and experienced doctors, the of quality and standard of health services would considerably improve. (Pajhwok)

On Wednesday, the PC member along with his armed bodyguards forced his way into the Pajhwok central office without permission.

During a meeting with Pajhwok senior staff, Mohammadi said: "I hope you people will not waste your energy in unnecessary topics."

"The land grabbing issue is six years old. If I am a land usurper, there is government, judiciary and police who should arrest me," he said.

About his school certificate, he said many government officials, including CEO Abdullah Abdullah and others held fake degrees and Pajhwok should make a report on them.

"On directives of a few corrupt people why do you waste your time, you indulged yourself in unnecessary issues that create problems," continued Mohammadi.

He said it was government's responsibility to investigate the land grabbing issue of not a media's job.

During the one hour meeting, Mohammadi used an aggressive language and warned if Pajhwok published land grabbing related report regarding him, he would tie the Pajhwok reporter in Parwan to a car and would drag him.

"Don't disturb people. I swear, I would capture your reporter in Parwan and would beat him up."

He repeated his warning saying he would capture the Pajhwok reporter and would beat him fifty times if the report was published.

Pajhwok Afghan News head Danish Karokhel said his organization was committed to journalistic principles and used to publish reports after taking viewpoints from all sides.

Kharokhel said if a Pajhwok staff member faced any security issues in Kabul or provinces, the responsibility would be on Mohammadi.

He condemned Mohammadi's entry to Pajhwok office with armed bodyguards and said the PC member used harsh language during the meeting.

He asked the government to take steps for safety and protection of journalists and media organizations in the country. (Pajhwok)
