ANA Soldiers Among 57 Dead in Clashes: MoD

KABUL - Six Afghan National Army (ANA) soldiers and over 57 insurgents have been killed during clashes with security forces in different parts of the country, the Ministry of Defence (MoD) said on Wednesday.

A statement from the MoD said militants suffered heavy casualties in the last two days clashes in four different provinces.

In Chaharsada district of Ghor province, as many as 31 rebels were killed while 17 others killed in Jawand district of Badghis province. One rebel was died in

The statement said eight militants were killed in Shindand district of Herat province and ten others wounded in the four provinces, the statement noted.

It said that during the clearing operations conducted in these provinces, security forces seized huge cache of weapons.

The statement, however, said that six ANA soldiers died as a result of mine explosion that struck their vehicle. (Pajhwok)

tion is being constructed at a cost of \$75 million in northern city of Mazar-i-Sharif, officials said on Wednesday. The station would jointly be constructed by privately-owned Ghazanfar Group and World bank (WB).

An agreement about the building of the project was signed by officials of ministries of mines, energy and water and finance and representatives of Ghazanfar Group and WB in Kabul.

Mohammad Ismail Ghazanfar, chairman of the Ghazanfar Group, said the project's primary procedures would be completed in three months and then a contract would be signed. "After signing contract the company will take six to nine months to complete."

Ghazanfar added 40 per cent of the cost would be paid by his company while the rest was being paid by a member of the WB's International finance Corporation (IFC).

The initial capacity of the station, he added, would be 50 megawatt electricity but with further investment it would generate up o 1,000 megawatt.

Abdul Razaq Samadi, head of Da Afghanistan Breshna Shirkat (DABS), asked ministry of mines to provide the Shiberghan natural gas with an efficient price to the company so that cheap electricity could be provided to Mazar-i-Sharif residents....(*More on P4*)...(27)

Flash Flood Kills 11 in Ghor

CHEKHCHARAN - Hamidullah Dadfar, director of Afghanistan National Disaster Management Authority (ANDMA), said Wednesday that 11 people have been killed in a flash flood in Ghor province.

Four people died in Shahrak, four in Du Layna districts and three others in Ali Yar area of Ghor Capital, Dadfar said



According to Dadfar, over a hundred homes and thousands of acres of land were damaged in Tuesday's flash flood and that dozens of livestock have also been killed. Dadfar said traffic was also affected on Ghor-Herat Highway because of damage caused to the road. (Tolonews)

Unknown Men Kill Woman, Slit Her Child's Throat

KABUL - A group of unknown men allegedly killed a woman and slit her one-year-old child's throat in Lab-e-Jar area, Kabul city on Monday.

The incident allegedly took place on Monday afternoon at the victims house, which is only a few meters away from two police check points.

The victim's husband Mohammad Nadir claims that on Monday a group of unknown men entered his house and attacked his wife

Nadir said: "I have never had any enemies and I am not in debt to anyone. Also, my wife was not young."

Najib, the victim's nephew said: "Look at our house. Two police check points on either side of my house. If police cannot help people then what are the police for? What is government for? A women killed in her own house and a child's throat cut . . . where is the law in this country?"


