

(1) US to ...

US senator has urged that the ongoing war doesn't belong to Afghanistan its also our war against terrorism.

They have insisted on strengthen of ties in between Kabul-Washington. US senator Rose Lit who is the chief of foreign committee for Asia-Africa in US senate house has said, "US is interested to strengthen its ties with Afghanistan, we will not leave this country, we are committed on the ongoing war in Afghanistan because terrorism is our joint enemy." Chief Executive of Afghanistan Abdullah Abdullah responded that things have changed, but there are some challenges-opportunities ahead of both countries, we promise to stay with US shoulder to shoulder, we also appreciate the recent decision of US Government for keeping its troops to Afghanistan on 2016.

After the talks in between both US-Afghan officials ended Chief of executive deputy spokesman Jawid Faisal said, "parts of the speeches were equipping Afghan security forces, and exerting pressures on those countries supporting terrorisms in the region."

Earlier Afghanistan had demanded for its troops to be well equipped with heavy guns, and improving of its military air forces, US Government has promised to deliver 20 jet fighters by the end of 2018. (ATN)

(2) Ghani Condemns ...

At least three women among seven passengers were reportedly beheaded by Daesh militants in Arghandab district in Zabul.

The victims were the residents of Ghazni province and were abducted few months ago when they were travelling to Ghazni.

"Profoundly saddened upon finding out about this tragic incident, the President said that the heartless killing of innocent individuals, especially women and children, has no justification in any religion or creed and the enemies of Afghanistan gain nothing but shame in this world and wrath in the hereafter," said the statement from Presidential Palace. Ghani has also offered his deepest condolences and sympathies to the families of the martyrs of the tragic incident, the statement reads.

According to the statement, Ghani has also held "an extraordinary security meeting today to seek ways for tracking down and punishing the perpetrators of this atrocious crime and commiserate with the families of the victims." Earlier, the Police Chief of Zabul, Jailani Farahi, confirmed the victims were beheaded by "These passengers were with Daesh militants who beheaded them," Farahi said. "We were able to receive their bodies with the help of tribal elders."

However this was the first time that women are being beheaded in the country.

"Among those beheaded were three women whose necks were brutally cut," head of Zabul provincial council Atta Jan Haq Parast said.

Daesh - who originated from Iraq and Syria - is an extremist Islamic militant group that has recently emerged in parts of Afghanistan. (Tolonews)

export since New Delhi signed a strategic partnership with Kabul in 2011, the deal doesn't offer something new to home suppliers. Make in India is no longer in the picture, because the induction of Mi-25 choppers is directly inclined towards Russian suppliers. in late September and holding it for several days caused shock among Afghanistan's international partners, who have invested billions of dollars trying to create a security force capable of standing on its own. "The situation is sobering, it is not as stable as we hoped it would be," said General Hans-Lothar Domroese, a veteran of Afghanistan who is Germany's second-most senior general in the NATO alliance.

Speaking at the margins of a NATO exercise in Spain, he said weak government control in many areas and corruption were making the job of reinforcing security more difficult, but added: "If we don't stay, they will drift into a maelstrom, and there is a significant danger that they get torn away."

Ministers from NATO countries are due to meet in early December to decide on the future of Resolute Support, the non-combat NATO-led mission launched in January to train, advise and assist the Afghan government and security forces. Formally the NATO-Afghan agreement is open-ended, but in practice its future depends on member countries' willingness to commit troops and resources.

Officials describe a sense of fatigue and doubt about the strategy of the coalition of NATO partners and allies following Washington's announcement it would extend troop levels through most of 2016 due to worsening security. "Nobody is pleased with the progress," said one NATO diplomat in Brussels, who spoke on condition of anonymity. "The alliance's forces can't keep helping forever ... Right now we are helping them more than we'd like."

There are fewer than 14,000 coalition troops in the country, compared to around 140,000 a few years ago. Previous plans to reduce the numbers further appear to be on hold, and several nations have signaled they will extend their troop levels along with the United States. (Tolonews)

A member of Afghan delegation assigned for Kunduz to launch an investigation Mohammad Naim Rafiqi said, "no name was mentioned in the following report, but some of the institutions came under the pressures."

Senator Mohammad Faisal Sami said, "I think the report which was delivered to Presidential palace will be forgotten as other reports were." Part of the Ariana News report which documented the investigation process of the Afghan delegation assigned for Kunduz fall indicating that members of the investigative committee aren't satisfied with the performances of the local officials in Kunduz which caused the city to be controlled by Taliban for three days. A question remains what will be the measurements of the President over the neglects of those local officials in Kunduz province? (ATN)

Pakistan will also suffer in its aftermath. Peace in Afghanistan is not only in the interest of the two countries, but also of the whole world.

He also added "The whole region could come under the wave of terrorism if the two neighbouring countries and the world didn't take steps to fight terrorism."

Khan called on Islamabad and Kabul to normalise their relations, insisting that no country would should interfere in the affairs of another country and jointly work for eliminating terrorism.

"Both the countries should fight terrorism or else the region would face more instability and violence," he added.

Khan is the president of Awami National Party (ANP) of Pakistan. In his remarks last month, Khan criticized the failure to maintain a spirit created by President Mohammad Ashraf Ghani following his visit to Pakistan, saying Kabul and Islamabad were on the path of reconciliation.

However, he said some quarters have re-adopted their previous policies regarding Afghanistan, without disclosing further information regarding the circles. His remarks were followed by President Mohammad Ashraf Ghani's statement earlier in May this year, saying Pakistan is engaged in an undeclared war with Afghanistan. (KP)

down and talk. Mosazai and several Western diplomats joined members of the civil society from Afghanistan and Pakistan who opened a two-day dialogue at a time when tensions have affected official contacts.

An Afghan and a Pakistani research centers have launched the "Pakistan-Afghanistan Track 1.5/II project Beyond Boundaries" as part of its efforts to help improve relations between the two neighbors.

"When leaders from Afghanistan and Pakistan, when government officials from Afghanistan and Pakistan and when the people of Afghanistan and Pakistan sit down in the same room and have frank and candid and open conversation, we can find solutions, we can outline constructive, positive strategies, we can come to specific decision points on improving our relations," Mosazai told the opening session.

The initiative was launched by Pakistan's Center of Research and Security Studies (CRSS) in partnership with its Afghan counterpart Duran Research and Analysis (DRA).

"We believe that the civil society in Pakistan, the civil society in Afghanistan can become extremely substantial, extremely important stakeholders in the state-to-state and in the country-to-country cooperation and ties between Afghanistan and Pakistan," the Afghan envoy said.

Pakistan's Commerce Minister Khurram Dastagir told the participants that it was Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif's strong desire to end the years of mutual hostility between Afghanistan and Pakistan.

"We had to reckon with this that there did exist mistrust and hostility and there was a need to steer the stakeholders toward negotiations." "It is critically important to bring together media people from both the countries to help improve the perceptions on each other," the minister said.

British High Commissioner to Pakistan, Phillip Barton, welcomed Pakistan's initiative to broker peace talks between the Afghan government and the Taliban.

He also appreciated Afghan President Ashraf Ghani's move to reach out to Pakistan shortly after he had assumed office.

"Healthy relations between Pakistan and Afghanistan are vital for stability, security and prosperity of the two countries, the region and the world. Peace processes are never easy, but in the end, dialogue is the only route to peace," said the high commissioner. (Xinhua)

(8) Taliban Had...

"Once again she was forced to marry but she didn't accept. There are footages showing her to say that 'I don't accept this marriage'," said Mawlawi Mohammad Musa Kalim, deputy head of Ghor Ulema Council.

But a local Taliban commander Mullah Yousuf - who failed after many attempts to marry Rokhshana to his brother - captured Rokhshana and handed her over to other Taliban members.

Meanwhile, another local Taliban member Mullah Hashim decreed the stoning of Rokhshana after her family failed to pay the ransom.

They also called Rokhshana's father to attend her public execution in a village, 40 kilometers from Firozkoh, the provincial capital.

The local religious leaders said Rokhshana was stoned by a group of people who were criminals themselves.

They called on the government to bring the perpetrators of the inhumane act to justice.

"If government doesn't arrest those who stoned Rokhshana, they will carry out more heinous crimes," said Hamidullah Mutahid, a member of Ghor Ulema Council.

They called the stoning contrary to Islamic teachings and demanded for quick response of government. (Tolonews)

(9) Housing Scheme ...

the controversial project, President Ashraf Ghani on Saturday issued a decree invalidating the contract recently signed with Frozi, a bankrupt debtor of Kabul Bank.

Frozi was freed from prison last week on Wednesday to take part in the inaugural of "Smart City Township" project he signed with the Ministry of Urban Development.

At the inaugural ceremony of the project worth \$900 million USD, the government officials said the program was aimed at helping the debtors to become able to repay their obligations.

But the legal experts and a number of MPs raised questions on how the government can give a project to a criminal.

The legal experts call the move unlawful and a violation of Criminal Law of Afghanistan.

"Those who were involved in this contract have done treason," MP Ramazan Bashardost said.

But some other lawmakers = claimed on Sunday that senior government officials were bribed by Frozi - who was sentenced to 10 years in jail in a court verdict last November.

He was found guilty in embezzlement of over \$900 million in cash and assets of Kabul Bank - collapsed in 2010. (Tolonews)

(10) Nangarhar ...

Islamic Emirate - referring to Daesh or Taliban-style so-called Islamic ruling.

They said the reason for their protest was rise in corruption, failure to address students' complains and the poor management in the university. "We are tired of democracy, we want Islamic caliphate, we want a fair caliphate and an Islamic sys-

tem," a protestor said, chanting anti-government slogans.

The footages went viral on social media shows the students that can hardly be differentiated from militant groups due to wearing Taliban and Daesh masks.

"We have staged this protest to get our rights," another protesting student said.

But the University chancellor, Babrak Meyakhail, rejected the claims of students over poor management as baseless.

"Demands beyond the university are not acceptable at all," Meyakhail said. "But the other issues you mentioned must be addressed by the relevant organizations."

However the unprecedented move has led to strong criticism of the students who are deemed country's future.

"Unfortunately, extremism is on the rise for several years in the country," MP Sayed Abdul Qayum Sajadi. "If the issue is not curbed, it will leave worst consequences."

However this is not the first time that the residents and the students are staging protests under the flags of militant groups.

Speculations suggest that militant groups can easily recruit soldiers from these students. (Tolonews)

(11) Afghanistan ...

Barmak, head of ANDMA said. Meanwhile, officials in National Bureau of Disaster say that Central, South, North and Northeastern regions of the country are the most vulnerable areas which the death toll of landmines recorded to 38 incidents per month.

According to Natural Disaster Management Authority, Afghanistan spent 55 to \$ 60 million in the areas clearing landmines and unexploded explosives yearly.

After decades of war, Afghanistan is littered with land mines and unexploded ordnance. In the last years, more than thousands of people have been killed or injured by so-called unexploded remnants of war. (ATN)

Surkhrud districts of Nangarhar province.

According to NSP Provincial Manager in Nangarhar province, these development projects encompass the construction of protection walls 2,921 meters in length, 6,608 meters of irrigation canals, a 105-meter intake, 15,924 meters of sidewalks, 56 culverts, 520 meters of retaining walls, 16,305 kilo meters of rural roads, 325 meters of side ditches, community centers, micro hydro power stations, a water reservoir and excavation of 275 wells.

Approximately, 24,422 families in various communities have been able to get access to basic human needs upon completion of these projects.

Since its inception in Nangarhar province, the NSP has been able to execute 4,548 development projects in different sectors including transport, water and sanitation, irrigation, power, livelihoods, education, etc while the work of another 624 is currently in progress. (PR)
