The reservoir of the dam is 20 kilometer long and 3 kilometer wide and has a storage capacity of 640 million cubic meters of water.

Nangarhar from their presence. Barpachir area has recently fallen under Daesh control.

"If the militants are not eliminated once and for all, they would find access to Tora Bora area of Pachiragam and try to convert Afghanistan into the center of a Daesh Khorasan," the lawmaker said.

"The Afghan forces are busy fighting Daesh militants in most areas of the country while unknown helicopters at midnight drop food to Taliban rebels," he said, without giving more de-

Deputy MoD spokesman, Brig. Gen. Mohammad Radminsh, called Qadir's speech as a threat to Afghan forces but said operations against Daesh were underway in Pachiragam district. He said 27 Daesh militants were killed and a number of their hideouts destroyed during the past 24 hours in Nangarhar.

Daesh insurgents were unable to threaten security of Nangarhar districts, he said.

A year back, Haji Zahir Qadir along with hundreds of his armed supporters carried out raids against Daesh for three months. After his operations ended, he returned to Kabul and told the lower house that Daesh members were living in Kabul.

He said IS officials in Kabul had government support, particularly of the National Security Advisor.

#### Yemen's Hadi **Rejects UN-Proposed Peace Deal**

ANKARA - Two suicide bombers blew themselves up during anti-terror operations in the Turkish capital Ankara early Saturday, said a local news agency.

The terrorists were reportedly planning a car-bomb attack in Haymana, a southern district in the city. They refused to surrender and triggered the bomb after anti-terror police told them to lay down their arms, said Dogan News Agency. The local agency did not say if casualties were involved in the bombing. The terrorists were most likely from the outlawed Kurdish Workers' Party(PKK), said Ercan Topaca, a local governor at the explosion spot in Haymana, adding that the identity of the female bomber has been confirmed and the investigation remains on going. On Oct. 7, police in the city of Aksaray in the Central Anatolian region of Turkey detained a PKK militant as the suspect of the Oct. 6 motorcycle bomb attack in Istanbul, said the state-run Anadolu news agency. The attack took place near a police station in the Yenibosna neighborhood of Istanbul in the afternoon, leaving 10 civilians wounded. (Xinhua)

### France, Britain Feud over Young 'Jungle' **Migrants**

CALAIS, France - France demanded on Friday that Britain take in hundreds of minors from war-torn countries after the British interior minister suggested that Paris should do more for them following the closure of the "Jungle" migrant camp in the northern French port city of Calais.

Bulldozers are flattening the sprawl of ramshackle huts and tents which had been home to about 6,000 refugees and migrants from Asia, the Middle East and Africa hoping to cross the English Channel and start new lives in Britain.

Most have now been bussed to other centres across France pending examination of their cases. But the plight of hundreds of minors roaming the area, nearly 1,500 of whom have signed up for temporary lodging in container-boxes in Calais, has become a point of dispute.

British Home Secretary (Interior Minister) Amber Rudd told her French counterpart Bernard Cazeneuve on Friday that his government must guarantee the protection of youngsters left in limbo after the evacuation of the "Jungle". "Any child either eligible or not in the secure area of the camp should be cared for and safeguarded by the French authorities. We understand that specialist facilities have been made available elsewhere in France to ensure this happens," Rudd's spokesman quoted her as saying.

Cazeneuve replied that Britain should "quickly execute its responsibilities to take in these minors, who hope to come to the United Kingdom. This is the best way to give them the protection they are due," he said. (Reuters)
